

Adverb clause of comparison

Adverb clauses of comparison are of two types:

1. Adverb clauses of comparison of degree
2. Adverb clauses of comparison of manner

Adverb clauses of comparison of degree are introduced by the subordinating conjunction *than* or by the relative adverb *as*.

In most cases the verb of the adverb clause of comparison of degree is not expressed. In such cases, we are more likely to use an object pronoun after *than*.

Nobody loves you more than me. OR Nobody loves you more than I do.

I earn more than he does. OR I earn more than him.

You are not more intelligent than him. OR You are not more intelligent than he is.

Adverb clauses of comparison of manner are introduced by the relative adverb *as*.

You may do as you please.

It all ended as we expected.

As you have made your bed so you must lie on it.
